# Proclamation of the 81st Anniversary of D-Day


WHEREAS, June 6, 1944, Allied forces launched Operation Overlord, the largest amphibious invasion in military history, storming the beaches of Normandy, France, to begin the liberation of Europe from Nazi occupation; and

WHEREAS, more than 156,000 Allied troops- American, British, Canadian, and others- demonstrated extraordinary courage and determination under relentless fire, with over 4000 making the ultimate sacrifice on that single day; and

WHEREAS, the D-Day invasion marked a turning point in World War 11, and its success laid the foundation for the Allied victory and the restoration of freedom and democracy across the continent; and

WHEREAS, the heroism of the "Greatest Generation," including those who fought, supported, and sustained the war effort, remains a timeless example of unity, patriotism, and selfless service. On this 81st anniversary, we remember and honor the bravery, sacrifice, and enduring legacy of those who served on D-Day, and we commit ourselves to preserving their memory and the principles for which they fought.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED, that I, Edward Lachterman, along with the Town Board of the Town of Yorktown, do proclaim that on the 81ST Anniversary of D-Day, June 6, 2025, we will pause, reflect, and honor the men and women

### Proclamation this 14th day of June, 2025

WHEREAS, our country's flag was created in 1777, when America was still a new idea. Americans flew it during the Revolutionary War as brave troops fought for our country's independence from British rule, representing the resolve and resilience of our Nation's stars and stripes. For people across America, our flag reminds us of our Nation's founding principle. It stands for the sacred idea that we are all created equal and deserve to be treated as such throughout our lives; and

WHEREAS, on Flag Day and during National Flag Week, we honor all that the flag means to the American people and continue working to ensure that America is a land of possibilities for all; and

WHEREAS, throughout history, America's Armed Forces have been sentinels of liberty. By keeping the flame of freedom burning bright, they have made our Nation stronger and the world safer. No matter how dark the night, our flag will always be there, and

WHEREAS, we encourage all Americans to display the flag of the United States at their homes and businesses on Flag Day. We urge citizens to honor the American spirit, celebrate our history and the foundational values we strive to uphold, and recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America publicly.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED,** that I, Edward A. Lachterman, along with the Town Board of the Town of Yorktown, suggest we give significant expression to our thoughtful love of America, our comprehension of the great mission of liberty and justice.



#### Proclamation this 12th day of June, 2025

WHEREAS, throughout history, women have been among the patriots who have defended our land and liberty from every enemy. Many women have served in the military, in occupations from pilots to nurses in both peacetime and war. We owe all of them a special debt of gratitude for their part in advancing the promise of freedom, and

WHEREAS, Women were permitted to serve as permanent members of the United States Armed Forces with the enactment of the Armed Services Integration Act of 1948. Still, the federal law restricted women to no more than 2% of the enlisted force for each branch of the United States Armed Forces. A subsequent act in 1967 lifted the restrictions and allowed women to achieve higher military ranks; and

WHEREAS, laws passed since the 1970's have formally granted veteran status to women with World War 11 service, have recognized the many contributions made by women veterans; and have allowed women veterans more equal status and access to benefits, opportunities, and programs from the federal government, state governments, and veteran service organizations; and

WHEREAS, Women continue to enrich our country in civilian life as they bring their skills and patriotism to bear in communities across America. Let us use the "Women Veterans Day" to honor the service, sacrifice, and love of country so gladly given by our women veterans.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that I, Edward A. Lachterman, and the Town Board of the Town of Yorktown, encourage all Americans and government officials at every level to celebrate these women with appropriate ceremonies and activities.



## Proclamation this 3rd day of June 2025
