Historic Yorktown

Yorktown is one of the oldest towns in Westchester County. Its deep roots are reflected in a large number of historic structures and sites that have survived the passage of time. **The Yorktown Landmarks**

Preservation Commission (YLPC) is composed of local volunteers appointed by the Town Board to assist property owners in preserving this valuable legacy for future generations and to promote

Yorktown's profile as a community with a rich heritage. Numerous recent studies have indicated that historic preservation fosters local pride, creates jobs and increases property values.



Yorktown encompasses several **distinct neighborhoods** ~ Crompond Corners, Croton Heights, Hallock's Mill, Huntersville, Jefferson Valley, Kitchawan, Mohegan Lake, Shrub Oak, Teatown and Yorktown Heights. While each of these communities is rich in history, the absence of a single town center has complicated efforts to preserve Yorktown's past in a coordinated way. Much local character was lost to modern development during the second half of the 20th century and even today historic sites are neglected and early structures continue to be demolished.

"Progress with Preservation" Programs:

Homes of Historic Distinction

A recent survey conducted by the historic architectural firm, Larsen Fisher, identified over 200 houses of notable interest in Yorktown. In this new initiative, the YLPC hopes to mark many of these structures with exterior plaques similar to those found in other historic towns that will allow the residents and visitors to appreciate our past. Interested owners are urged to contact the YLPC by email or letter and share whatever information they may have regarding their property. At the same time, the YLPC will reach out to owners of eligible properties and conduct research when needed.

Local Landmark Designation

Formal designation is the "**gold standard**" of historic preservation as it ensures that an historic property or site can never be destroyed except in cases of financial hardship. At the present time, Yorktown has **14 designated structures** although many more are eligible for this distinction. Landmarking does not restrict an owner's right to make appropriate alterations and the YLPC will assist owners to ensure that their plans preserve the historic character and value of their home. Designated structures receive a large and attractive marker for their property.
